Hundreds of prisoner of war camps were set up in the UK during the two World Wars, with several in The Hundred Parishes. Camps varied in design and size. Some started as rows of tents with the prisoners engaged in constructing huts. Most have disappeared but I would like to tell you about a few.

In 1917, during the First World War, a camp was established at Great Dunmow's workhouse, initially taking about 100 German POWs. Capacity was later doubled by moving women elsewhere and closing the infirmary. The German prisoners worked on local farms but gained a reputation for obstruction and destruction. Dunmow workhouse never reopened and was converted to the housing that today is called The Close.

Bower Hall in Steeple Bumpstead was used as a POW camp in The First World War but it fell into ruin and was demolished in 1926.

Wynches POW camp in Much Hadham was situated in forty acres of parkland and in the Second World War housed both Italian and German prisoners.

Ickleton Grange housed a camp for both Italian and German men. Nothing now remains.

In Mill Lane, Hatfield Heath, the remains of POW camp 116 are still clearly visible, the most complete survivor in Essex, Herts or Cambridgeshire. The camp was set up in 1941 to house Austrian and Italian prisoners; later, German men followed. They worked on local farms and even played football against a Hatfield Heath team who were beaten 11- 0!

Radwinter North POW rehabilitation camp was situated in the grounds of Radwinter Rectory, now known as Radwinter Manor. German soldiers were allowed to visit local families. Karl Weschke was one; he became an artist and his clay sculpture of a weeping mother and child titled "Deutschland 1946" is held in Saffron Walden Museum.

CHRISHALL VILLAGE HALL MAINTENANCE

Chrishall Parish Council decided to grasp the nettle and tackle the damp issues in the Chapel Hall following a survey carried out by Wilby & Burnett.



The building survey showed that the damp issues were caused by a variety of factors including an unventilated concrete cap in the chimney, the chimney being full of rubble, incorrectly positioned leadwork around the chimney directing water away from the gutter and down the wall and unconnected downpipes.

The contractors have done an excellent job in replacing all guttering and redirecting the flow from the roof, removing the concrete capping and ensuring the correct ventilation of the chimney, cutting out and replacing damaged plaster to the chimney and installing a fully operational surface water drainage system.

Sincere thanks are extended to Bill Irvin and Stuart Pelan of Wilby & Burnett for their professionalism in managing this work, and to the contractors for their workmanship and

dedication to resolving the problems.

There remains an outstanding damp problem created under previous ownership through the installation of impervious damp-proofing, which is preventing the walls from breathing. This will require the cutting back of all the impervious plasterwork, with the walls being allowed to dry out properly before lime plaster is applied. This work will be carried out over the coming months.

The Parish Council is awaiting quotes for further repairs highlighted in the survey to the roofs of both halls, and for repairs to the wooden window frames which have areas of significant rot.

It is only through the diligent work and professionalism of Wilby & Burnett that the Parish Council has been able to take the correct action to resolve these historic issues.





We are a small charity, based in Hertfordshire villages, run by volunteers, committed to the empowerment of women and girls, and reducing forced migration from 26 very poor villages in the Indian desert state of Rajasthan. Our team of trustees, many of whom have been with us since the start, have worked with the same NGO in Rajasthan since 2000. We are in constant communication with them and can respond to emergencies quickly and effectively. During the Covid pandemic we have been able to authorise the delivery of emergency food parcels to thousands of villagers.

In Khandel light's project area of Rajasthan, India, girls are under pressure to leave education as young as 14 to get married.

Over the last 21 years, through improved access to drinking water, sanitation, healthcare, housing, and education Khandel light has established the basis for creating opportunities. Since 2018, we have funded a Girls' Parliament, which empowers girls to negotiate the barriers to continuing their education. One of the girls, Puja, has a particularly moving and inspiring story to tell.

Puja's mother is blind, and her father disabled, which makes employment almost impossible.

There was pressure on Puja to leave school at 14 and get married to reduce the financial burden. Through membership of the Girls' Parliament, and visits from the local girl MPs Puja's parents have acknowledged the benefit to her and to them of staying on at school.

Puja was spending several hours a day collecting water and doing domestic work, so we have given the family a 10,000-litre water tank and arranged for it to be filled with drinking water every month. She has also received an education bursary, allowing her family to have the financial freedom for her to attend school.

In Puja's own words, translated from Hindi:

"After joining the Parliament meetings, I started feeling that the window of my mind, which used to open and close in my house, was now open and I started to feel that the world outside is very peaceful and beautiful. By attending the Parliament sessions in myself, I felt that from the windows of my mind I can now look all around, that is, now it is increasing my self-esteem and self-confidence. After joining the Parliament, my identity in the village has increased. By giving priority to me, I was made a water house in which drinking water is being regularly available every month, due to which my time is saved. Now I can buy medicine for my blind mother and handicapped father by sewing more, and I am also able to run the household expenses"

£5 will enable Puja and the other 700 girls like her to attend the parliament for a WHOLE YEAR!

£27 will fund Puja's further education FOR A YEAR!

£130 will give another family a drinking water tank (or a toilet)

£3.80 will pay for delivery of a month's drinking water

During the COVID-19 pandemic, we have delivered 1,500 food parcels to families where the breadwinner has been unable to work

£15 will buy a food parcel which will sustain a family for 5-6 weeks.

WILLIAM WALTER BRAND TRUST

Helping villagers within the Chrishall Parish Boundary

The Trust was founded in 1989 on the death of Mr William Walter Brand, a local farmer and landowner. As a village, we are very fortunate to have the Trust, whose aim is to give support to those in our community who may be suffering hardship. It has, of course, been a very difficult time for everyone, but the Brand Trust is always available to help those who need it.

This year, we welcomed Simon Bishop as our new Trustee, replacing Mark Garrett who retired from the Trust after 27 years of sterling service.

The Trustees will consider applications for help with costs related to:

- education - including transport costs, university grants, and a grant to help pay for secondary school uniforms
- providing disability aids, eg stairlifts, including installation and maintenance
- medical and respite care
- essential furniture and kitchen equipment
- utility costs

The Trust subsidises the Chrishall Lifeline scheme which provides wristband or pendant emergency alarms for any villagers who may be alone or vulnerable, helping them to stay independent and safe in their homes.

We offered a Winter Heating Allowance again this year. If you missed the application form in the last Newsletter and would like to apply for this, please contact one of the Trustees listed below.

We understand that some people might be reluctant to come forward for help, but it's important that we include everyone who can benefit from the Trust. If you know of anybody that does need help, or you need it for yourself, then please don't hesitate to contact (in complete confidence) any of the Trustees below.

CHRISHALL WI NEWS

Chrishall WI meet on the 3rd Wednesday of the month in the Village Hall, Crawley End, Chrishall at 7:15 pm for a 7:30 pm start.



The WI provides women with fun and friendship, plus the chance to learn new skills, get involved within the community and take part in a wide range of activities.

In October Captain Adrian McCourt spoke to us about Trinity House – an organisation that we did not know much about. It is a charity dedicated to safeguarding shipping and seafarers, providing education, support and welfare to the seafaring community with a statutory duty as a General Lighthouse Authority to deliver reliable, efficient and cost-effective aids to navigation service for the benefit and safety of all mariners. It has been doing this since it was incorporated by Royal Charter in 1514 by King Henry VIII. A few of the many nautical aids it looks after are sixty operational lighthouses, buoys, light vessels, light floats and beacons. It also generates lots of income to give away – they train cadets, support maritime charities, provide welfare for retired mariners and run educational programmes teaching safety at sea skills.

In November Barry Carter who is the Chair and Team Leader for Cambridgeshire Search and Rescue and the husband of one of our members, spoke to us about the very valuable work this charity does. It assists the police in searching for high-risk, vulnerable missing people, including anyone that maybe despondent, suicidal, suffering from dementia or a mental illness. The team is made up of volunteers from all walks of life who are regularly called out at any time of day or night 365 days of the year. They have to fundraise in order to pay for all their vehicles, petrol, insurance, uniform and kit.

Barbara Smith: Librarian:

Chrishall Parish Council is sorry to advise that Barbara Smith is moving away from the village. Barbara developed our library and has been a diligent supporter of the Parish Council, for which we are most grateful. We sincerely thank Barbara for her service to the village, and hope that she enjoys her new ventures.

Highways Issues: all landowners and householders are reminded that it is their responsibility to maintain hedges and ditches which have a public highway as a boundary. Now is the time to carry out hedge work as we are now outside the bird nesting season.

Climate Change: COP 26 has just closed and Chrishall Parish Council is keen to hear your views and comments about what Chrishall residents, individually and as a whole, can do to reduce our carbon footprint and increase wildlife, habitats and ecosystems across the Parish, while potentially linking to other Parishes to form networks for wildlife. The focus of the Annual Parish Meeting will be on environmental issues. We would be delighted to hear your suggestions for the meeting and any issues you wish to discuss.

Parish Council vacancy:

We have five vacancies which are open to residents, property owners and people who work in the parish. There are several important issues which need our full attention and you are urged to consider whether you can assist us.

District & County Councillors: a vote of thanks

Chrishall Parish Council would like to formally extend a vote of thanks to our hard-working District and County Councillors. They have all worked diligently for the Parish, and this has been evidenced by their attendance at our meetings, the invaluable advice and support they have provided, and by the way in which they have resolved some long-standing issues in the parish. In recent months, Cllr Gadd has managed to get Essex County Council Highways to repair the large pothole at the exit to the school driveway and the edge-of-road overruns on Mill Causeway and has worked on issues related to school transport. Cllrs Gregory & Pavitt have likewise worked on school transport, provided support and advice, particularly in relation to Heydon Grange planning applications, on water and sewage issues in Mill Causeway and Crawley End, and supported a number of residents with their issues. We are privileged to have such hard-working Councillors.

Parish Council-owned buildings: update:

The Parish Council owns the Village Hall, the Brand Pavilion and the Robert Reed Hall attached to the school. The Village Hall has a fantastic management committee which works with the Parish Council to ensure the building is kept in good order and is run at a profit. The Brand Pavilion has after-school club and other activities which ensure that it is cost effective. The upkeep of the Pavilion is supported by fundraising carried out by the Friends of the Brand Pavilion. Robert Reed Hall is on a long-term lease to Chrishall School, and, as with the other buildings, is run on a profit basis.

These buildings all require ongoing maintenance and improvements, and this will be borne in mind when the budget is set, which will take place at the January meeting.

Neighbourhood Watch:

Please do become more involved in this initiative managed by Essex Police.

Methodist Burial Ground:

The Parish Council is actively managing the area close to the shed to create an insect-friendly habitat. Whilst it may look a little untidy at some times during the year, we have to delay cutting so that the existing wildflowers can set seed.

Parish Council finances: The audit report from PKF Littlejohn, the external auditor, did not report any issues of concern. All relevant documents have been loaded to the Parish Council website.
