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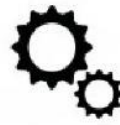

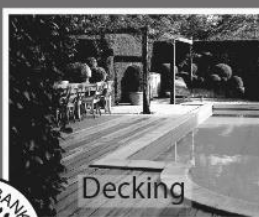

WILLIAM WALTER BRAND TRUST

Helping villagers within the Chrishall Parish Boundary

The Trust was founded in 1989 on the death of Mr William Walter Brand, a local farmer and landowner. As a village, we are very fortunate to have the Trust, whose aim is to give support to those in our community who may be suffering hardship. The difficult times which we are all experiencing continue but the Brand Trust is always available to help those who need it.

The Trustees will consider applications for help with costs related to:

- education – including a grant to help pay for secondary school uniforms, a grant for those going to university, further education or apprenticeships, school trips and assistance with school transport where the county council does not provide a free bus
- providing disability aids, eg stairlifts, including installation and maintenance
- essential household items
- help with utility costs, including an annual heating allowance

Our annual heating allowance was offered earlier this year (in April) and included an additional amount to help with rising Cost of Living expenses.

If your annual household income is less than £20,000 and you did not apply for this grant in April and would like to now, please contact one of the Trustees for an application form.

The Trust also subsidises the Chrishall Lifeline scheme (via NHS CareCall) which provides pendant emergency alarms for any villagers who may be alone or vulnerable, helping them to stay independent and safe in their homes.

We understand that some people might be reluctant to come forward for help, but it's important that we include everyone who can benefit from the Trust. If you know of anybody that does need help, or you need it for yourself, then please don't hesitate to contact (in complete confidence) any of the Trustees below.

CHRISHALL WI NEWS

Chrishall WI meet on the 3rd Wednesday of the month in the Village Hall, Crawley End, Chrishall at 7:15 for a 7:30 pm start.



For our September meeting we had a very interesting talk from Gilly Bamber about "Search and Rescue Dogs". She is part of the Cambridge Search and Rescue Team. Two dog handlers came with her – Louise and John – who brought their search and rescue dogs with them – Murphy and Pip. She explained that all breeds are suitable for this work as long as they have long noses and a good sense of smell. There are two types of search dog disciplines – Air Scent and Mantrailing.



In October we welcomed Joss Minterne – who is a paramedic. He told us that paramedicine started in 1971 and since 2021 entry to this work is by degree only. After training, paramedics can specialise in different areas of the health service. There is lots of equipment in ambulances that paramedics can use on patients in order to take them to hospital in a stable state.

We opened our November meeting to friends and partners as our talk was given by acclaimed local biographer, Clare Mulley, about "The Women Who Flew for Hitler" – a dual biography of Nazi Germany's most highly decorated women pilots. Hanna Reitsch and Melitta von Stauffenberg were talented, courageous and strikingly attractive women who fought convention to make their names in the male-dominated field of flight in 1930s Germany. With the war, both became pioneering test pilots and were awarded the Iron Cross for service to the Third Reich. But they could not have been more different and neither woman had a good word to say for the other. Hanna was middle-class, vivacious, and distinctly Aryan, while the darker, more self-effacing Melitta came from an aristocratic Prussian family. Both were driven by deeply held convictions about honour and patriotism; but ultimately, while Hanna tried to save Hitler's life, begging him to let her fly him to safety in April 1945, Melitta covertly supported the most famous attempt to assassinate the Führer. Their interwoven lives provide vivid insight into Nazi Germany and its attitudes toward women, class, and race. This is an almost unknown story and Clare is a very knowledgeable and enthusiastic speaker.

Thank you to everyone who visited and contributed to our Harvest display at the Village Hall in September. We had a lovely afternoon with lots of old friends meeting up, news and views exchanged and some new names and corrections for the field map! Please keep these coming in. If you hear someone mention a field name please make a

note of not only the name but where it is and any stories behind it. I have **nearly 100 field names** in the database now and information continues to come in on their possible sources and stories that go with them. The results of all this research will be in the displays and website articles for next year, and possibly a zoom talk too. I was hoping to get a talk in before Christmas but I am still sifting all the information and time is running away so perhaps in the new year. Keep an eye on the website for details.



One of my favourite finds so far – although it is about a pond and not a field – is the name of Rooks pond. Rooks is the pond opposite the chapel and used to be named on old postcards (see left). It is the only pond I know with a specific name. As far as I know the others are known as Martinholme pond and Wire Farm pond ... and Rooks.

It turns out that in a survey of the village done in the late 1500s there was a close called Rooks that "abutted Crawley End", i.e. was next to the road. So is this the pond to go with the field? Research is ongoing!

As this will be the Christmas edition of the newsletter I thought a quiz was in order so you will find a wordsearch of some of Chrishall's field names elsewhere in this magazine. I wonder if you know where they are in the village as well as in the puzzle?!

JUBILEE WOOD

We have been wanting to encourage more wildlife back by tidying up and planting wild flowers but we wanted to do more by planting trees and putting back hedges... and more wild flowers.

So in January 2022, we applied to The Woodland Trust through their MOREwoods scheme for a grant for trees and hedges. After a site survey, we were approved for the grant and provision of nearly 2,000 trees, which were delivered on 23rd November.

On Saturday 26th November, more than 30 friends and family pitched up with spades, mallets and secateurs to help us plant the trees and we cannot thank them enough for all of their efforts.



Species include: 500 common oak; 300 hornbeam; 250 wild cherry; crab apple; field maple; rowan; silver birch, hazel and a few scots pine. Under the electricity cables, to create a safe flight path for the birds, we will be planting a mixture of: spindle, quickthorn and dogwood.

We probably won't be here when the wood is fully grown but as one of our young volunteers said "I can keep an eye on it for you, I'll only be 49".

We hope that everyone will enjoy watching the wood grow

THOUGHTS OF A NEWSLETTER DELIVERER

Over the ten years or more that I have been delivering village newsletters I have developed a lot of sympathy with postmen.

The village is split into several rounds so each deliverer only has around 30 newsletters to deliver, which generally doesn't take too long. My round provides me with a few challenges though and the quarterly excursion to deliver the newsletters always provokes a few muttered swear words (which I hope go unheard by the recipients).

A particular challenge is the letter box with a strong spring and a pair of bristly brushes lurking behind. There is supposed to be a gap between the brushes, but it is not always easy to find and often if you manage to find it the newsletter prefers not to go through.

At this point fingertips need to be used and that is the point at which a few years ago a silently watching dog decided to have a piece out of one of mine. Generally though, the newsletter eventually decides to go through without too much damage either to the paper or to the deliverer.

It is at this moment, as you are withdrawing your hand, that the strongly sprung flap decides to scrape most of the skin off the back of your hand. This may not be too much of a problem for younger folk, but we oldies tend to develop skin like parchment which doesn't take kindly to even minor abrasions.

I have tried wearing a pair of thin rubber gloves, which gives some protection but doesn't make selecting the next newsletter from the pile a very easy task, especially if you tend to the ham fisted at the best of times, as I do.

A less common but equally infuriating type of letterbox is the one about 3 inches (7.5 centimetres for younger readers) wide. This is generally found in the door of an old cottage and it dates from the time when people apparently received very little post, except perhaps scribbled notes. It is necessary to fold even an A5 sized magazine to get it through this letterbox and one wonders what state A4 documents are in when the postman has managed to force them through and they hit the hall floor.

The owners of these properties, which are probably Grade 2 listed, are to be commended for taking care to ensure that even the letter box is as authentic as possible and I must apologise that the village newsletter ends up on the hall floor folded in two. Unfortunately, though, there seems to be no other way.

Lastly, I am told that some houses don't have anywhere to leave post, but fortunately there are none of those on my round so I will spare you my thoughts on the matter.

If I were in charge, every property would be required to have an external letterbox large enough to take A4 sized post. I suspect that a lot of postmen might support me, because after all they are delivering post rather more frequently than once a quarter! Possibly some of you are relieved that I am not in charge though.....

Planning: Residents are reminded that the Parish Council is a statutory consultee to planning applications. The Parish Council takes account of the comments submitted to it by residents most likely to be affected. Please note that the decision to approve or refuse an application is taken by Uttlesford District Council. Appeals are decided by the Planning Inspectorate.

Uttlesford District Council Local Plan

Chrishall Parish Council would ask that you keep apprised of the progress of the local plan as it will guide the future of the District, and particularly planning.

Parish Council owned buildings and assets: update:

The red telephone box in Palmers Lane is now in place. The shelving for the mini-library has been commissioned.

Ponds: The Parish Council owns Chambers Pond, outside Martinholme, and Broad Green Pond. Both ponds contain Great Crested Newts and residents are reminded that these are a protected species. Please refer to the paragraphs on biodiversity and ecology which follow.

Bus Shelter: consideration is being given to repurposing the bus shelter as a "Village Information Hub". The central Parish notice board would be removed from its current location and an alternative noticeboard installed within the bus shelter. Also it is the intention to use the Information Hub to display boards that show photographs and words illustrating the village history.

Biodiversity and Ecology:

The Parish Council would draw attention to legislation around watercourse, ponds and protected species.

Your attention is drawn to <https://www.gov.uk/guidance/owning-a-watercourse> with which the Parish Council must comply.

- Garden debris should not be deposited within ten metres of a water course or pond.
- Chemical runoff should not be allowed to enter a water course or pond.

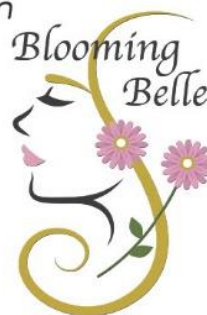

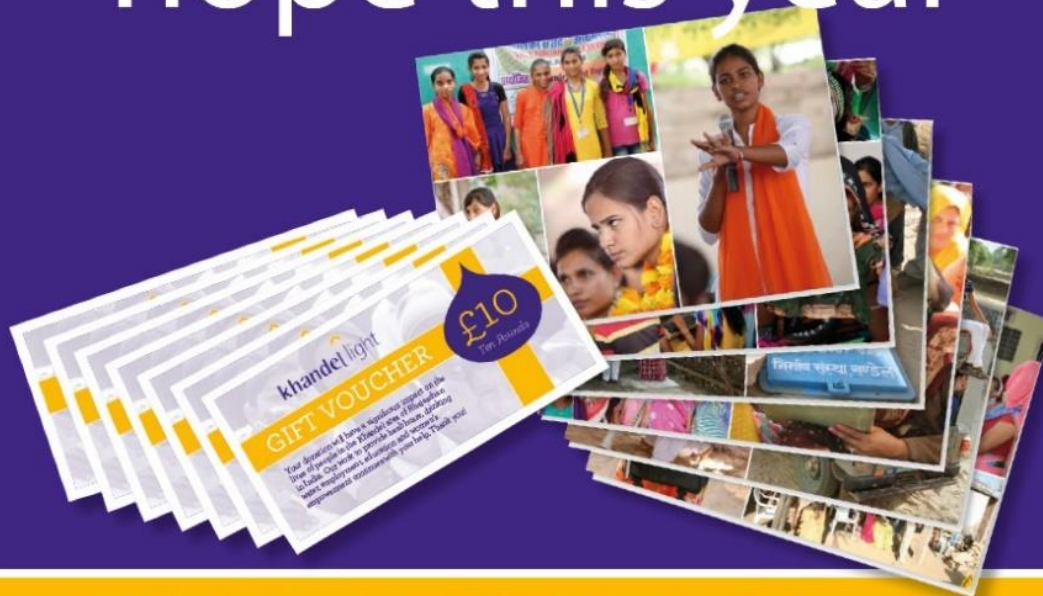
